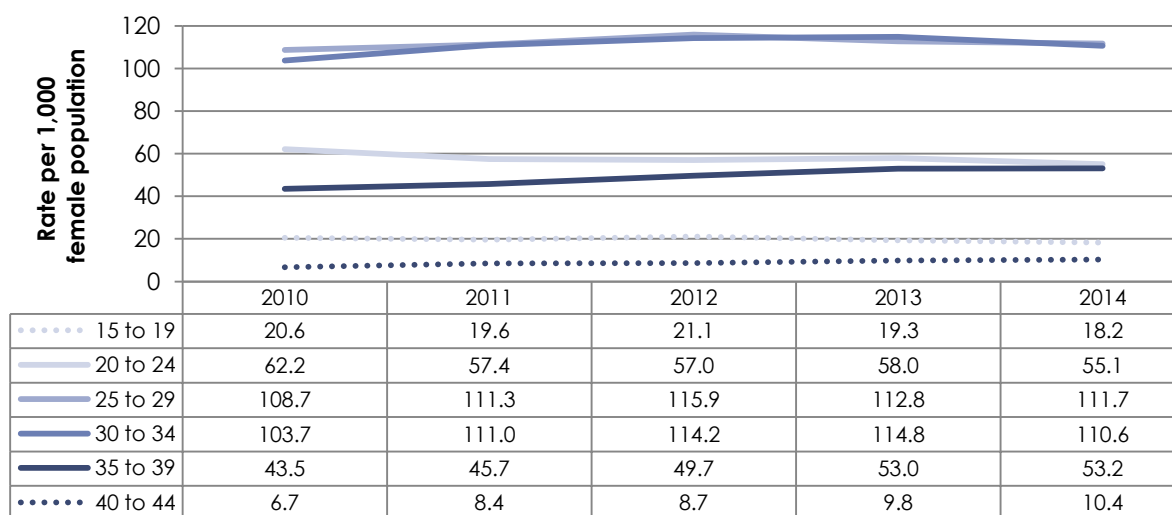


Birth Rates Additional Data

Highlights

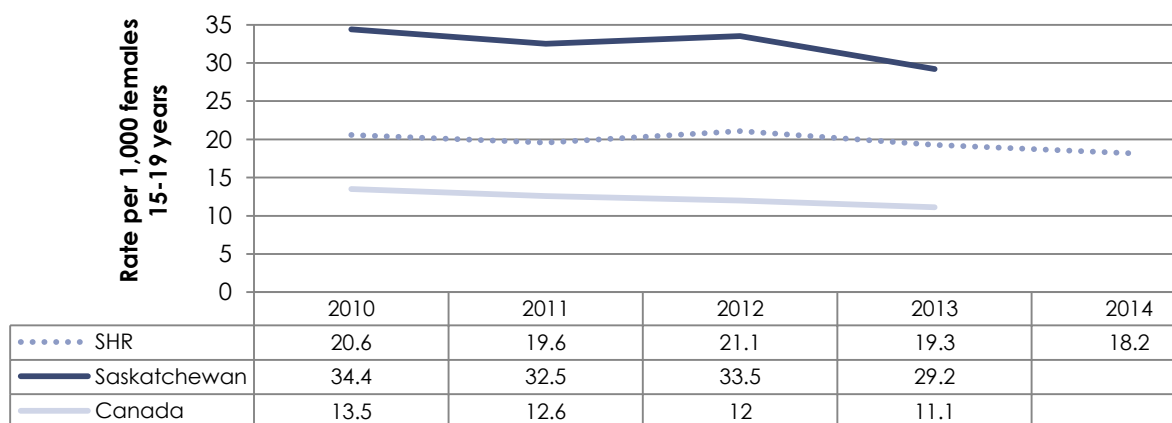
- Fertility rates for women 30 to 44 years have been increasing since 2010 (Figure 1). Rates for 15 to 24 year olds have been decreasing slightly since that time.
- Teenage birth rates have been decreasing over time though are still higher in Saskatoon Health Region compared to national figures (Figure 2). Teenage pregnancy rates were six times higher for those living in the most disadvantaged areas of Saskatoon compared to the most advantaged areas in 2014 (61.3 per 100,000 vs 10.1 per 100,000; Figure 3).
- Teenage pregnancy rates for people living in Saskatoon and in Rosthern and area were higher compared to those living in other parts of the Region (Figure 4). Rosthern and area had the highest teenage pregnancy rate at 34.9 per 100,000 in 2014.

Figure 1: Age-Specific Fertility Rate, Saskatoon Health Region, 2010 to 2014



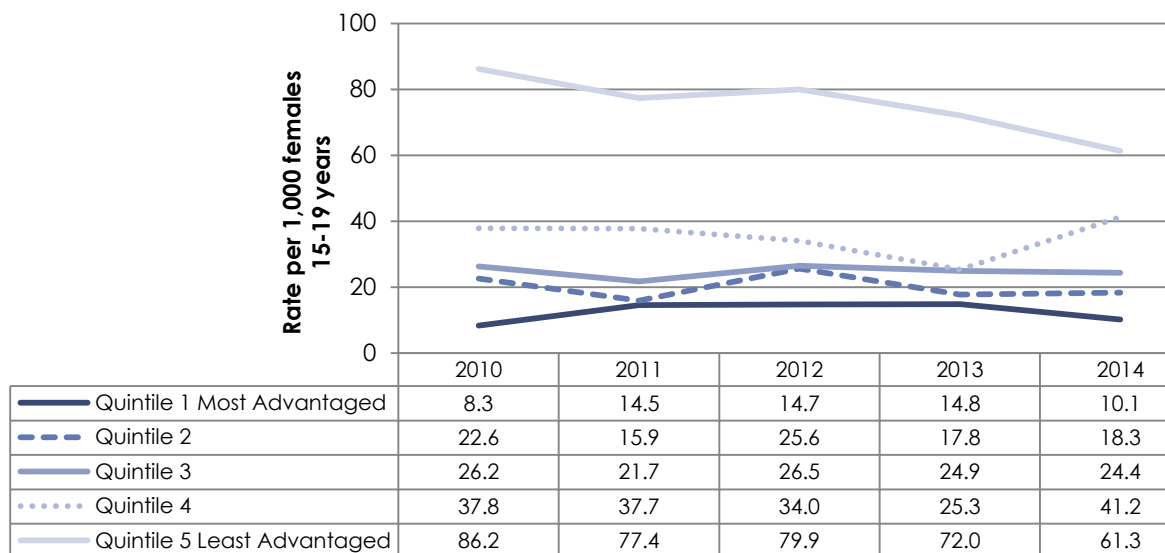

Figure 2: Teenage Birth Rates, Saskatoon Health Region, Saskatchewan, Canada, 2010 to 2014



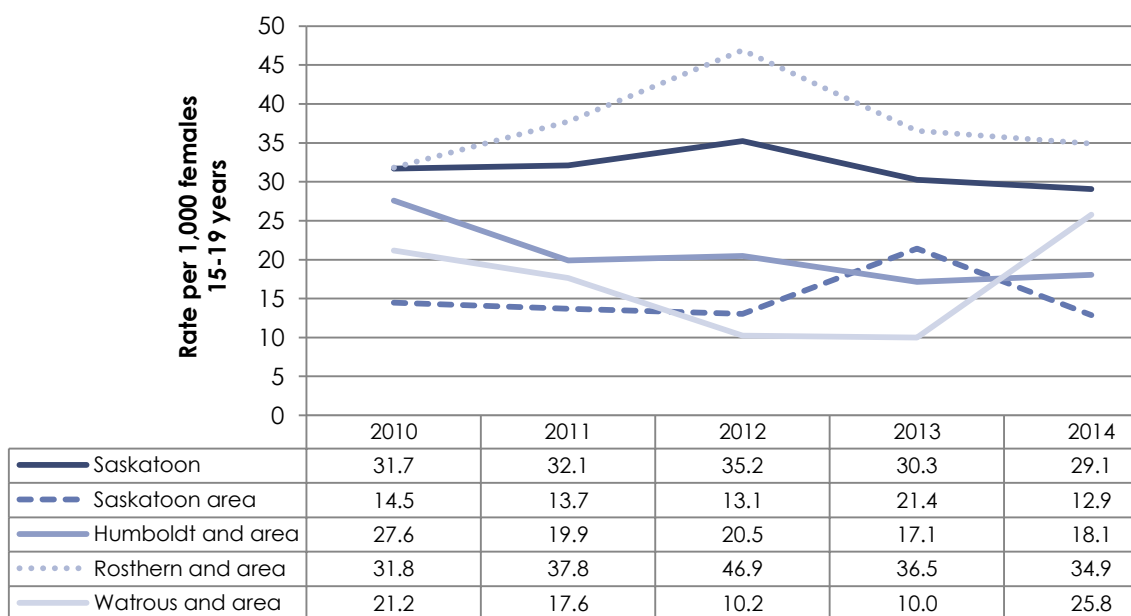
